
St Swithun's Church Family 2 Before Lent

Today we read the opening passage of the Gospel of John as well as a passage from Proverbs. In these Bible readings we hear about Wisdom and Word. Today in our worship I hope we will reflect on our images of God and enter into the mystery of God's love more fully as we grow together in faith.

Bible Reading Proverbs 8.1, 22-31

A reading from the book of Proverbs.

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water. Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills, I was brought forth—when he had not yet made earth and fields, or the world's first bits of soil. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above, when he established the fountains

of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit, so that the waters might not transgress his command, when he marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him, like a master worker; and I was daily his delight, rejoicing before him always, rejoicing in his inhabited world and delighting in the human race.


Gospel Reading John 1: 1-14

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory to you, O Lord.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you O Christ.**



Sermon *Mother Juliet* When we think about God – what do you imagine – what words or images come to mind?

When we look at the images of God that we find in the Bible – we can see the vastness of God. We are given so many different pictures or ideas about what God is like.



Names are important for our identity – our names convey to the world something of who we are...

How do you like your name? Has it helped shape you? Would you prefer a different name – if so what and why?

Rossy and I have many things in common – but one of them is that we both have daughters called Sophia... who both live up to the meaning of their name...

The name Sophia means wisdom... or Holy Wisdom. Our first reading today tells us about this Wisdom – this Sophia – which tells us about God...

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? On the heights, beside the way, at the crossroads she takes her stand; beside the gates in front of the town, at the entrance of the portals she cries out: To you, O people, I call, and my cry is to all that live.

Wisdom is a feminine image of God which is connected with the Logos, the Greek word for God's Word, which we heard in our second reading today – "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God".

This reading from the beginning of the Gospel of John is always heard at Christmastime - it tells us about Jesus being there from the beginning and that the Word is a thread that runs throughout all creation. It is saying that Jesus is the Word - that Jesus is Holy Wisdom. When I asked you at the beginning how you imagine God – honestly – did we stick with one idea and one image?

Often we stick too narrowly to a particular or specific image of God – too often I encounter people on their journey of faith who are terrified by an angry God or are fearful that they are not good enough because their image of God is one of judgement from on high – missing the importance of God who is loving and merciful....

Perhaps our words we use in our worship need to be carefully reflected on – does our liturgical life inhibit the mystery, the height, depth and width of God.

God is our Father, our Lord, our King, our Brother, our Friend, our Lover. God is a Rock, a Shield, a Fortress, a Strong Tower, a River. God is Saviour, Redeemer, Deliverer. God is a Consuming Fire, God is Power, Strength. God is our Mother, the one who labours, and brings her people to Birth. God is Wisdom.

These are just a few of the Biblical images of God. How does it feel to pray to God, Holy Wisdom, Sophia? How does it change

the way you live out your faith if you spend time with God who you name and image with the wonderful pictures and words we are given from the Bible?

For if we take Scripture seriously, we must see that God has revealed Godself, in many many more ways than the limited words we too often use. Our vision of God can be enlarged. The only thing we have to lose are the limits we have set on God.



As we journey deeper into God on our Christian journey, let us not limit God by limiting the metaphors and images we use. As we grow in faith, recognizing that we are in the image of God, let us also not limit each other. Often we want to label others – to parcel them up into our way of understanding them rather than to see them in all their glory... we have to remember that other people are not the sum of the limits we impose on them just as God is not restricted to our limited ideas about who God is – God is beyond our understanding.



How we understand others is often more about our own inability to see with open eyes and open hearts – do we set limits on what we think someone will be like based on what they look like, what they sound like, what society says about them, what we have previously encountered.



As an inclusive church – we need to always remember to align ourselves with God's limitless love and to see those we encounter as made in the image of God. Often these limits spring from our fear and insecurities – the more scary the world feels to us the more we want to parcel it up into something simplistic – often reducing complexity into polarized black and white thinking. It is fear

that drives us to want to be right. Faith, however, encourages us to see more fully – to go beyond our fears and to see with open eyes and open hearts. To shine a light into those fears – faith drives us beyond the urge to be right into being loving.

Think of the last big argument or disagreement you have had – would a focus on being loving instead of being right have changed that situation for you? Seeing others as God sees all people is as simple as recognizing in Jesus the love that God has for all people. Love enough to become one of us and to live amongst us. It is harder for us to begin to see the complexity that is behind that great love.

Our readings today help us to begin to glimpse Godself. They are telling us that Jesus is Word and also Wisdom of God.

They also point us to God's love, God's light, and to the fact that this light is with us always.

Jesus is our light and no darkness in our lives can overcome that light – even though at the moment many of us feel a lot of overwhelming fear and darkness. Our own light may go out for a while leaving us feeling lost in the darkness. But being part of the church family means that someone else nearby is carrying a light and can hold that up for us until our anxiety and gloominess passes. We need each other – and we need to see each other fully as God's children.



Together let us shine God's limitless love, God's light into the world – let us support each other and shine that light for each other whatever challenges we continue to face. Let us grow in faith, hope and love as we dare to see each other and to see God more fully. Let us look beyond our narrowness into the vastness of God's love.

We pray for those things in our lives which feel overshadowed by doubt, fear and gloominess - help us to act from faith and love as we navigate the challenges of daily life. May we always keep God's priorities at the heart of our lives and to shine a light into the world by acting to help our local and global neighbours. Help us to love others as you love us.

Jesus reminds us to love one another as we are loved. We pray for all those whose lives are weighed down with difficulties. For any known to us who need light to shine into their lives.
