

Saying sorry - prayers of penitence

Let us say sorry to God

Talk to God about the things you are sorry about so that you can restore your relationship with God, with others and yourself...

When things get on top of us.

When we walk on by.

When we turn up the volume.

When we ignore the things that we should have done.

When we consume more than we need.

The Liturgy of the Word

The Gospel Reading Mark 1: 9-15

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark Glory to you, O Lord

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.' And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness for forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ.**



Sermon Richard Evans

It is the first Sunday of Lent. We have just started on a journey that will take us over 6 weeks and lead us to Easter Sunday. My grandfather used to say that anyone who was particularly miserable had "a face as long as Lent".

The idea of Lent being a long struggle; a time for tough discipline; perhaps a bit of self-denial; giving things up for Lent... these ideas conjure up a traditional view of this time in the church calendar.

More recently, people have begun to talk about not just giving up things for Lent but taking up something: an activity or practice that you start doing and keep going through the time of Lent that will make something positive of the season.

What have you decided to do this Lent?

What are you hoping that the experience of Lent will bring to your faith-life?

Today in our reading we heard about the story behind Lent.

Last week, we heard about the bizarre events of the transfiguration of Jesus. Do you remember that we heard the words from heaven: "This is my son, the beloved..."? We recalled another time when a voice from heaven described Jesus as "beloved" and this is where we start today's reading; Jesus' baptism in the river Jordan. This was the very start of the story of Jesus' ministry and we are reading about it in the Gospel of Mark.

Mark's Gospel is the earliest of the written records of Jesus' life that we have in our Bible and it is action-packed. Mark doesn't hang about or give lots of detail. His story of Jesus is full of movement and excitement and you get the impression that the spare detail is the very least Mark wants to give us to get the point across.

So here we are. Jesus, God's beloved is baptised, the story is under way and "immediately" Mark tells us, "immediately the Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness". What picture does "wilderness" conjure up for you? A barren desert, perhaps. A lonely and forbidding place where it is difficult to live comfortably. These days, the word wilderness is often used of a remote, unspoiled and beautiful place. But you wouldn't necessarily want to live there or be there on your own. God's beloved son immediately he started his ministry encountered the wilderness. Being beloved of God does not mean that we will avoid times when we find ourselves in a lonely and forbidding place.



Jesus was there for a long time. Forty days we are told, and this is where we get the idea of forty days for Lent.

For many people, this Lent will indeed be a hard and challenging time in their lives. They are no less loved by God.


For Jesus, the wilderness was definitely a tough time, struggling with temptations. It is as if Mark is describing the start of his mission against the forces of evil in the world. It is a struggle that takes place in loneliness and isolation.

Being beloved of God does not mean that we will avoid times when we feel alone and struggling.

Can you identify with this sort of experience? We all know what this feels like.

I am not saying that we need to make a wilderness time for ourselves in Lent. Wilderness times will come without us creating them. During Lent, the point is not that we need to make things difficult for their own sake. I think as we remember Jesus' 40 days of wilderness living we can find a way to focus in a new way and to discover what it is that is at the heart of our faith.

In the other Gospels, we hear details of Jesus' temptations. But here in Mark, the only other detail we have is that Jesus was waited upon by angels.



Have you found that there have been angels, messengers from God, to help you when you have faced times in the wilderness?

As we take our journey through Lent, where might we find help from God?

What angels will we look out for so that our Lent is blessed and we come close to God?

If we think of our Lent journey as a way to get away from distractions and find out for ourselves about the essence of our faith, what angels might we find to help us on the way?

At the end of the time in the desert, we read that Jesus came to Galilee and began to tell people good news. "It is time" is roughly what he said. Time for a new start. Time to really begin to find out what life with God is all about. Our Covid year has been as long a wilderness journey as any of us could have imagined. For many this year has been unbearably hard.

Perhaps your Lent this year is a healing time. A time for God to restore you and for the angels to minister to you.



Or perhaps some challenges are necessary for us this Lent. Some disciplines to help us refocus on the essence of our faith. The angels are there for all of us however we need to approach Lent this year.

By the time we come to Easter Sunday, even if we might find it hard to believe that God counts us as "beloved"; as beloved as Jesus, I pray that we will all have found our loving God to be closer than we could have imagined.

It is time for a new start. Amen
